3 N Wildlife Coordinator Role Sept 1st 2017-Sept 27, 2019

- Coordination of all meetings for the 3 Nations Wildlife Project;
- Develops and maintains good working relationships with the 3 Nations team members, BC provincial staff and any 3 Nation members who may be requesting information;
- Communicates with other First Nations and Government Agencies for follow up from meetings and to complete
 action items that may be assigned to the incumbent during meetings;
- With direction from 3N WLL, prepares and provides information agenda and supporting materials for all meetings,
- Being willing to make presentations for and in cooperation with the 3 Nations and BC Wildlife Lead
- Works in cooperation with 3N WLL to organize meetings as required to support internal 3 Nations teamwork and to
 ensure cooperative communication with the BC team members as required,
- Coordinates and supports ongoing communication processes within the 3 Nations and provincial Wildlife staff as required to support wildlife management activities in the 3 Nations territories.
- Provide technical wildlife and lands expertise
- Be involved as needed with strategic planning sessions to make sure front line perspective is included
- Reports and advice as needed

Tahltan Wolf Trapping Program

- Record track observations
- Eliminate numbers of wolves within traditional territory
- Increase ungulate numbers
- Predator management is a priority for Tahltan.
- Focusing on areas around Dease Lake, the Burn, and Klappan.
- Last season a total of 7 wolves were trapped
- The goal of the predator program is to ensure our communities are safe, and to increase the abundance of ungulate populations







Beaver Trapping Program

- Nuisance beaver removal in partnership with LDM
- Focus along highways with Traditional Territory
- Beaver used for bait in wolf trapping program
- Educational program at schools teaching about skinning hides and traditional use of beaver and harvest

Overview of Land Guardian Program

TRTFN Land Guardian Program



What is the Land Guardian Program?

The Land Guardian program is an initiative of the Taku River Tlingit First Nation (TRTFN) Lands & Resources Department. The Land Guardians act as the "eyes and ears" of TRTFN Lands Department by monitoring land activities that inform decision making. The Land Guardian program supports the long term sustainable management of Tlingit lands and resources and plays a vital role maintaining strong cultural ties to the land and water.



What do the Land Guardians do?

- Land Guardians conduct regular monitoring patrols to observe, record & report information on land, water, and wildlife and how they are used.
- Land Guardians act as a liaison between TRTFN Government, Tlingit citizens and the general public.
- Land Guardians conduct inventories of abandoned equipment & contaminants in placer mines.
- Land Guardians engage in harvest monitoring by informing licensed hunters of BC hunting regulations & by working with the local Conservation Officer to monitor for compliance.
- Land Guardians engage in habitat rehabilitation through remediation, revegetation, and invasive species management.

Why is this program important?

- The Land Guardian program increases understanding that the Taku River Tlingit First Nation are active stewards of their Traditional Territory.
- The Land Guardian program enables Tlingit citizens to develop a sense of pride in the management of their Traditional Territory.
- The Land Guardian program builds capacity among Tlingit citizens and increases Tlingit engagement in the TRTFN Lands & Resources department and in land management.
- The Land Guardian program promotes cultural revitalization through implementation of cultural values and integration of the program with Elders and youth.



- Locations in proximity of placer mining sites
- Data collected:
- - water depth
- - ice thickness
- - Snow depths
- -pH, Dissolved oxygen, conductivity, water temp and turbidity



Traditional Knowledge Observations

- Abundance of berries this season than last year
- River ice freezing from bottom and ice chunks due to rain and warm weather
- Weather (rain in winter months, warmer temperatures)
- Changes in animal behavior







Hunter Survey Forms Tahltan 2019 Season August – October 2019

- General questions regarding regulation changes
- Overcrowding
- Pollution
- 5 hunter harvest surveys
- 21 wildlife observations

Hunter Survey Forms Kaska 2019 Season

August – October 2019

- Hunter harvest surveys (9 completed)
- Hunter Camp Observations (24 completed)
- Environmental Concerns (69 completed)
- Wildlife Observations (142 completed)
- Land Patrols Completed (65 Completed)



Land user Surveys TRTFN 2019 Season August

- October 2019

- 33 completed in total
- 6 hunter camp observations
- 27 surveys completed with land users



Challenges from all 3N

- Getting completed surveys during hunting season
- Relationship building with land users
- Better communication as to what guardian programs do
- Capacity issues
- Signs on regulation changes not provided
- Updates when reports are put into RAPP line
